



This Month's Speaker Dianne Dodd, Writing the History of CFUW

Dianne Dodd earned her PhD from Carleton University (1988) in Ottawa, and did a postdoctoral fellowship from Hannah/Associated Medical Services) at the University of Ottawa before working at the National Archives (now Library and Archives Canada). She has published in the fields of birth control, domestic technology, public health and nursing.

From 1996 to 2018, Dianne Dodd was employed at Parks Canada as an historian where she helped to enhance the commemoration of women in the Parks/Historic Sites and Monuments Board of Canada's program, writing research reports that led to new plaques and a few new historic sites, many devoted to women's role in history.

It has been decided by the executive, that we will be holding all our monthly meetings in 2020 virtually. We will re-evaluate the process in the New Year.

COVID Waiver

The COVID Waiver form is being sent to you with this October Newsletter as an email attachment. There is a separate attachment on COVID protocols that are being followed by sanctioned CFUW activities.

Through this waiver you acknowledge that:

- You know and are willing to take the risk of contracting COVID-19 whenever you physically get together for meetings and activities.
- You understand that is no pressure to physically attend a meeting or activity. If you feel unsafe, you can leave.
- You will not attend a face to face meeting if you are sick with any COVID symptom (this includes you or anyone in your household). You will go home if you begin to feel unwell.
- You will wait for 14 days after you or anyone in your household travels outside of Canada (or Ontario) before attending any physical meeting or activity.
- You will follow Public Health / government guidelines (hand washing/hand sanitizer, social distancing, wearing a mask, self-isolation if required).
- You waive and release any and all claims against CFUW Sudbury.

In anticipation of future occasions, every member is required to sign and submit this waiver. The waiver is to be used for face to face events; it is not required for activities taking place by Zoom or telephone. It is not necessary to submit the waiver for each activity, each member submits only ONE signed waiver – it will become part of your membership record this year. You must submit this waiver prior to attending any CFUW face to face activity – do it now if you haven't already!

Declaration of Climate Change Emergency by the City of Greater Sudbury

On May 28/19, the Council for the City of Greater Sudbury declared a Climate Change Emergency. The following describes why this matters and how it was accomplished.

As we all know, time is running out for the mitigation of Climate Change. We are already having to adapt to events resulting from Climate Change. (Parry Sound fires and expensive/destructive storm/flood in New Sudbury). The Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change is the United Nations body for assessing the science related to Climate Change. Political, community and industry action to these successive reports have been too slow and inadequate as Greta Thunberg and the FFF (Fridays For Future) youth movement point out. The IPCC report requires a 50% reduction in green house gases by 2030. We have all heard about the ramifications of enormous climate disruptions. There with increased social injustice particularly for those with the fewest life choices.

In 2019 our local FFF made up of children under 12, asked adults "to do something". Another local woman Carole Lavallee and I, noted that multiple municipalities in Quebec had declared a Climate Change Emergency. This became our "something".

What would you do if you set yourself to accomplish a goal that you knew little about and were warned had little chance of success? Carole and I did the following. Commit. Study. Seek out a mentor. Listen. Find council champions. Communicate with all city councillors regularly. Support council champions in a motion to council at a timely date. Spend time and more time in acquiring political will via a petition. Compile letters of endorsement from community groups. (Thank you CFUW Sudbury!). Seek out media attention. On the date of the city council meeting when the motion to declare a climate change emergency comes forward, fill the gallery at city hall. Publicly and privately thank all council members and the community of Greater Sudbury. Big credit and thanks to our mentor Naomi Grant. The local FFF youth thank us.

The Declaration of a Climate Change Emergency in 2019 has given significant focus to the Council of Greater Sudbury. The Council retreat post 'declaration' rated Climate Change as one of the five priorities for the city. Our city has adopted a climate lens for policies. The CEEP (Community Energy and Emissions Plan) for the future energy needs of Sudbury, was retooled to reflect IPCC/Climate Change goals.

Note: By the end of December, 2019, over 350 municipalities across Canada had 'declared' Climate Change an emergency.

BCLA Champion of Intellectual Freedom Award

Ashley Machum (daughter of club Treasurer, Shelley Machum) recently received the British Columbia Library Association's "Champion of Intellectual Freedom Award". The award reflects the association's commitment to intellectual freedom including the right to seek, receive, hold and disseminate information from all points of view. In her positon as Youth Services Librarian at the main branch of the Okanagan Regional Library (ORL) she initiated "Drag Queen Story Time" in the fall of 2019. It was ultimately well attended and well-received, but mounting the program was not without challenges. With the support of other professional librarians, she convinced skeptics that the tenets of intellectual freedom meant that a Drag Queen Story Time, where stories with a theme of "it's ok to be different" are presented by vetted drag queens, should be a welcome part of library programming. The event was attended by a record breaking audience of parents and children and was lauded by the Library Board, local media and community members. Ashley is now Head of Youth Services for the thirty branches of the ORL.
